THE EVENING SERVICE ON WEDNESDAY OF HOLY WEEK (MATINS AND LAUDS OF HOLY THURSDAY)

After the procession to the choir, all kneel down and pray silently. Then all stand up and say in silence Our Father, Hail Mary, and The Apostles' Creed.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

THE APOSTLES' CREED



THE COLLECT

Almighty God, we beseech thee graciously to behold this thy family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men, and to suffer death upon the Cross.

He adds silently:

Who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

Then a noise is made, the hidden lighted candle is shown, and all rise and leave in silence in the order in which they entered.
