MUSIC MINUTE

s the Church proposes texts for us to sing for the Responsorial Psalm and Alleluia, have proper texts intended to be sung at the Entrance, Offertory, and Communion ons... These scripture verses are chosen by the Church to help reveal the ar mystery being celebrated. Therefore, rather than agonize over which hymn to it seems fitting and preferable to use the texts provided by the Church as they are a the *Roman Missal* and the *Roman Gradual*.

t I desire most for sacred music in the liturgy is to shift our mindset from singing is to singing THE Mass. Utilizing the texts Christ has given us through the Church, restore the sacred and transcendent nature of the liturgy, emphasizing three nt principles: the sanctity of sacred music, the intrinsic beauty of sacred music, universality of sacred music.

Sacrosanctum Concilium, a document of the Second Vatican Council, calls for a reform of the liturgy. Paragraph 112 reminds us how to evaluate the sanctity of sacred music when it states, "Sacred music is to be *considered the more holy in proportion as it is more closely connected with the liturgical action*, whether it adds delight to prayer, fosters unity of minds, or confers greater solemnity upon the sacred rites."
